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## **PREFACE**

## **History**

The Uniform Crime Reporting data collection system became operational in 1962 after development by Statistics Canada with the co-operation and assistance of the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police, through their Police Information and Statistics Committee (Formerly the Uniform Crime Reporting Committee). The UCR Program is based within the Canadian Center for Justice Statistics, the focal point of a federal-provincial initiative dedicated to national statistics and information on the justice system in Canada. Established in 1981, the Center is responsible for producing information on the extent and nature of crime and the administration of criminal, civil, and administrative justice in Canada.

## **Information For Respondents**

**Authority:** Statistics Act, Revised Statutes of Canada, 1985, Chapter S19

**Responsibilities:** Police Services, at the federal, provincial and municipal levels provide crime and traffic enforcement data to the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics, which is a clearing house for these data: collecting, editing, compiling and disseminating the information.

The duties and responsibilities of Statistics Canada to collect and compile statistics in a variety of fields are contained in the Statistics Act, Revised Statutes of Canada 1985 Chapter 19. The Statistics Act accordingly constitutes the authority of the bureau to collect and report police statistics. The specific authority for this operation is as follows:

“Without limiting the duties of Statistics Canada under section 3 or affecting any of its powers or duties in respect of any specific statistics that may otherwise be authorized or required under this Act, the Chief Statistician shall, under the direction of the minister, collect, compile, analyze, abstract and publish statistics in relation to all or any of the following matters in Canada.

**Objectives:** This survey collects essential aggregated data on the extent of crime in Canada. Data are available at the municipal, provincial, and national levels for crime analysis, resource planning, and program

development for the policing community. Municipal and provincial governments use the data to aid decisions about the distribution of police resources, definitions of provincial standards and for comparisons with other departments and provinces. To the federal government the data provide information for the development and evaluation of policy and legislation, and for international comparisons. The federal government also uses the UCR Survey to provide information to the general public on the nature and extent of crime in Canada. As well, media, academics and researchers use these data to examine questions about crime.

### **The Measurement of Crime**

The Uniform Crime Reporting Survey was designed to produce an indicator of the incidence of crime in Canadian society. There are a number of ways of measuring the incidence of crime and each method will yield a different result. The characteristics of the counting process will affect the count which is obtained. Different data collection systems will produce different figures for the same series of events since the count of events is a reflection of the definitions which are used and the manner in which the data are gathered.

The process of measuring the incidence of crime is complicated by the great diversity of human behaviours which are considered to be criminal. One can conceive of a very wide spectrum of criminal human behaviours from the most trivial (an occasional truancy) to the most serious (homicide). It is unlikely that a single data collection system could be designed to deal with this broad diversity of events. Different data collection methods will be sensitive to different parts of the spectrum.

The Uniform Crime Reporting Survey was designed to have the local law enforcement agencies as respondents. This characteristic has very significant ramifications for the correct interpretation of UCR crime data. It means that the UCR survey can contain, at most, information on only those crimes which come to the attention of police. The UCR crime data, therefore, do not contain a count of all crimes in Canada: some crimes are never detected and some which are detected are never brought to the attention of the police and, therefore, these criminal events can never be recorded by the UCR survey.

The fact that UCR data are based on a count of those criminal events which are known to the police means that the crimes that are counted by the UCR system are a subset of all crimes in Canada. This characteristic also means that all the crimes that are included in the UCR data system have successfully passed a basic criterion - each of the crimes which is counted in the UCR system was thought by someone (a citizen or a law enforcement officer) to require the attention of the police who would take the appropriate action.

### **Language Preference**

This manual, all reporting forms, tally sheets and adjustment forms are available in both official languages and will be supplied in French or English upon request.

### **Submission of computer Tapes or Printouts**

In this manual, we discuss the scoring and procedures involved in contributing crime and traffic enforcement statistical data in the conventional manner (i.e. manually on uniform crime reporting returns). We are prepared to accept submissions on tape or other means from contributing police departments, or provincial authorities, that are or will be equipped with the necessary facilities. Contributors who may be interested in the submission of statistical data in this manner are requested to contact the Canadian Center for Justice Statistics (call 1-800-387-2231) at Statistics Canada, in order that we may be involved in the development of a format suitable to both the police department and Statistics Canada.

### **For Assistance**

This UCR manual attempts to deal with all situations which commonly arise in practice. However, it is impossible to foresee and to illustrate every circumstance. **CHAPTER I**  
**GENERAL RULES OF SCORING OFFENCES**  
**(FORMS "C", SUPPLEMENTARY "C", AND "T")**



## **A) Introduction to Terminology**

The purpose of this manual is to provide the UCR Survey respondents with a set of rules which will translate the content of occurrence reports into statistics. This set of rules should be applied in a uniform manner by different respondents in order that their statistics will be comparable.

In the UCR Survey, ordinary words are used in very specific and somewhat unusual ways. This section attempts to distinguish between the ordinary use of policing language and that language as it is used in the UCR Survey.

Three terms which have specific meaning to the UCR survey are, “violent” and “non-violent” offence, and “victim”. For the survey, a “violent” offence generally indicates a violation of the law which has included the use of aggressive action (with the intent to do harm) or threat of such action by one person against another. Under the UCR codes, the exceptions to this are some violations contained within “Other Sexual Offences”.

A “non-violent” offence is the converse of the above and means the absence of aggressive action or threat with the violation of the law.

The third term, “victim”, is a central concept in UCR scoring rules. For the purposes of scoring offences, a “victim” is a person who is the target of the above-defined violent/aggressive action or threat. Therefore, people who have lost property, either through damage or theft are considered “complainants” rather than “victims”.

The following three terms describe concepts which are important to an understanding of UCR scoring rules:

### 1. Violation

The survey is based on a term to be used in its common-sense meaning. This is the term “violation” (of the law). It refers to a contravention of the Criminal Code and other federal and provincial statutes and municipal by-laws.

### 2. The Offence: The Basic Unit of Count

As the reader will see, the term “offence” is used in a very special sense in the UCR project. It is important to understand that it is used to mean a statistical fact. “Offence” is not used in the usual sense found in police work, but is a product of specific definitions and counting rules.

There are two basic types of offences: violent and non-violent. The violent offences are counted in terms of the number of victims in the incident, the non-violent offences

are counted in terms of the number of incidents. More specifically, for certain violent crimes (i.e., Codes 001-006, 201-218, 066), the basic counting rule is that one victim equals one offence. The number of violent offences equals the number of victims for violent crimes. On the other hand, for non-violent offences (property, drug, etc), the basic counting rule is that one offence is counted for each distinct or separate incident. This rule means the number of non-violent offences equals the number of non-violent incidents.

The exception to this rule occurs when there is a theft of multiple vehicles from the same place at the same time each vehicle would be counted as a separate offence. However, the theft of four vehicles at the same time from a new or used car lot would involve one offence only.

Another exception to the above is the offence of robbery. It is included in the group of violent offences for analysis purposes but is counted or scored in UCR as a non-violent offence, i.e., one incident of robbery equals one offence, regardless of the number of victims.

### 3. Incident

The third term departs only slightly from ordinary usage. In general an incident is the set of connected events which usually constitutes an occurrence report. Occasionally an incident will not be identical with an occurrence report, i.e. one occurrence report could cover several incidents or only part of an incident. However, this is unusual in practice. To give the concept greater precision, an incident is defined as occurring:

- at the same time
- at the same place (in the case of motor vehicle theft, a motor vehicle is considered a place)
- under the same set of circumstances

These rules are translated in Chapter III into counting rules for specific types of offences.

#### The Continuous Offence: A Special Case

Where the same set of actions are repeated several times before detection, such as a bank teller stealing money on a daily basis from accounts, score as one offence as this is a continuous operation over time. Other examples would be: the father who repeatedly commits incest; a single operation which involves the theft of five car radios from the same parking lot; or the spraying of six cars apparently from the same spray can on the same night.

## **B) Scoring Rules**

### 1) Score Only from Police Sources

The basic source of information for UCR scoring is the police occurrence report. It is important that ALL categories of crime and traffic offences occurring within a police jurisdiction be reported so that statistical data published by Statistics Canada may be complete and factual. Unsolved offences must be reported as well as those crimes that are cleared. Only police departmental records should be used when compiling statistical returns. Subsequent decisions by court authorities to charge with a lesser offence are to be ignored as are court decisions, such as “not guilty”.

### 2) Sources of Information Available to the Police to be Used for the UCR Survey

As police are made aware of offences in several ways, procedures should allow for the recording of data from all sources such as:

- (1) Offences reported by a private citizen either by telephone or directly to a police station.
- (2) Offences coming to the attention of the police on the beat or on patrol, either from their own observation or as reported to them.
- (3) The police making an arrest during or after the commission of a crime before the complaint has been reported.
- (4) Private prosecutions of a criminal nature handled completely by the courts concerning offences occurring within your jurisdiction, of which the police are made aware, even though they may not be involved in the investigation; for example, by serving a summons or executing a warrant as the result of the laying of a “Private Information”.

### 3) Timing and Correct Reporting of Events on the Appropriate Forms

The UCR Survey is a monthly survey collecting aggregate crime (on Form “C” and Supplementary Form “C”) and Traffic data (“on Form “T”). When an offence is scored before the end of the month, but not cleared before the following month, clearance data should be included in the second month, i.e., the offence data should not be scored again.

In the event a monthly return contains an error, an adjustment form should be forwarded making the necessary correction. See Chapter VI.

#### 4) Assistance Cases

Duplication of reporting statistical data must be avoided. Report only those cases occurring in your geographical jurisdiction. Cases involving assistance to the police of another geographical jurisdiction must not be reported in your returns as they will be counted by the police department concerned. Similarly, arrests made or summonses served for another police force are not to be counted in your returns. Offences arising in one geographical jurisdiction which are resolved by the arrest of the offender in another geographical jurisdiction are described in greater detail in 7 (B) in this chapter.

#### 5) Simultaneous Scoring of Forms "C" and "T"

Where offences which are scored on separate forms (Form C&T) become known to the police at the same time, the most serious offence is to be classified on each form. Offences listed on Form C (Crime Statistics) and on Form T (Traffic Enforcement Statistics) are scored separately and in accordance with the multiple offence rule (pg. 1.7). The most serious offence is to be classified on each form. For example an impaired offender found to be in possession of a stolen credit card is arrested while driving a stolen automobile. The theft of the automobile only should be scored on Form C. Impaired Operation of a Motor Vehicle should be scored on Form T. The persons data are to be scored on each form.

#### 6) Definition of Most Serious Offence (MSO) Rule

Generally, one offence is counted for each victim of violent crime and each incident of non-violent crime (see page 1.3 for exceptions). When two or more violations of the law are perpetrated against the same victim or when two or more different non-violent crimes occur in the same incident, then a choice must be made because the "offence" is scored on only one line of Form "C". In these circumstances a "most serious offence" is selected.

Where several violations of the law occur in one incident, score the most serious violation. This is true even when the several violations contained in a single incident are distinctly different types. For example, the police may stop a car and find both a prohibited weapon and drugs. Score only one offence in such an incident, the most serious one.

The most serious offence is defined as:

- (a) Offences against the person (violent type) are always considered the most serious when violent and non-violent type offences occur in the same incident.
- (b) The most serious one as measured by the maximum penalty allowed by the law. Remember that attempted indictable offences may carry a lesser penalty. See Section 463 C.C.
- (c) The offence which is considered the most serious by the police when the penalties are the same.

In a situation where a peace officer is attacked by one of two men causing a disturbance, the MSO rule would indicate that only the assault on police (the more serious offence, as it is violent) would be scored.

It should be noted that the concept of an incident and a most serious offence applies to both violent and property crimes. Where a number of violent crimes are committed against a number of victims one would score the most serious violation against each victim. For example, where one person was sexually assaulted and in the same incident another person was sexually assaulted and murdered, one offence of sexual assault and one offence of murder would be scored.

## 7) Special Circumstances

### A) Clearing an Offence with a Related Charge

Sometimes in order to secure a guilty plea or because the evidence is stronger, a lesser related charge is laid although the police have sufficient evidence for a more serious charge. In these cases, the original more serious offence should be scored and is cleared (by charge) although the charge laid was for the lesser offence. See Chapter II, page 2.7 "Clearing an Offence with a Related Charge".

### B) Handling Cases from Other Jurisdictions: Reporting by Geographic Jurisdiction and Assistance Cases.

Where an offence is initiated in one geographical police jurisdiction and resolved in another, the following procedures should be followed:

- (i) The offender is arrested for the offence committed in the initial geographical police jurisdiction by an "outside" department and returned to face charges. This should be handled strictly as an assistance case and scored only by the department

having jurisdiction in the area where the offence was committed. The “outside” department should not report anything to the UCR Survey.

- (ii) The department having police jurisdiction in the area where the offender was arrested takes action to clear the offence by laying an information. For example, an automobile is stolen in one police jurisdiction and an accused is found with the stolen vehicle in another police jurisdiction. In circumstances of this nature, the police department in the jurisdiction where the automobile was stolen will report the original offence of theft of automobile, (code 027), and clear it “otherwise”(providing they can identify the accused as the person responsible for the automobile theft, having sufficient evidence to lay an information but do not charge the suspect). The department making the arrest and laying the “possession” charge, should score the offence of “Have Stolen Goods” (code 041), and clear it by charge.
- (iii) If both departments lay informations, the offences should be reported by each and cleared in the usual manner. For example, one department would report theft of automobile and clear the offence by charge. The other would score an offence of “Have Stolen Goods” cleared by charge.

C) Dealing with Simultaneous Charges for Offences which have Occurred Over a Period of Time: Persons Data

When a person is charged at one time with a number of offences which have occurred in separate incidents, score the “persons” (charged) data only once and against the most serious offence. All offences, however, are to be “cleared” by “charge”. The logic of this rule is that the “persons” data is to be a count of the number of persons processed by the police. See Chapter II.

**CHAPTER II**

## CHAPTER II

A facsimile of a form "C" is shown in Appendix 1, as is a Supplementary Form "C" in Appendix 1A.

### **Structure of Form "C" and Discussion of Scoring Rules for Form "C"**

Form "C" is divided into four parts:

**A) Offence Classification (Column 1)**

**B) Offence Data (Column 2-4)**

Reported, Unfounded, and Actual Offences.

**C) Offences Clearance Data (Columns 5-6)**

Cleared by Charge, Cleared Otherwise.

**D) Persons Data (Columns 7-11)**

Adults charged by gender, Young Offenders charged by gender, Young Offenders not charged.

Detailed instructions for scoring specific Form "C" and Supplementary Form "C" offences are contained in Chapter III.

**A) "Offence Classification" - Column 1**

The offence classification is the set of categories which are used to classify UCR data. Each of these offence categories is defined in greater detail in Chapter III of this manual. Similar types of crimes have been grouped together on the Form "C" and should assist in easier recording of data.



**B) “Offence Data” - Columns 2, 3 and 4**Column 2 - “Reported or known to Police”

Score as UCR data: (1) Offences, (2) Alleged offences, and (3) Attempted offences. These offences are to be reported in the month they become known to the police. This count of offences “Reported or Known to the Police” will include offences which upon investigation are determined to be “unfounded” as well as “actual offences”.

As citizens are not generally qualified to define the type of crime committed, care should be taken in scoring the offence in the appropriate category. For instance, assaults are sometimes reported to police as attempted murders. In these situations the proper offence category should only be determined by the police through an on-the-scene appraisal, or assessment of the circumstances as described by the complainant. An example of this is a telephone complaint that a robbery has occurred. Police investigation establishes the offence was not a robbery but rather a break and enter. The offence classified and scored would be the break and enter.

Do not score as offences:

- (1) alarms which have been accidentally set off through carelessness or mechanical failure;
- (2) complaints about persons acting in a suspicious manner;
- (3) routine preventive police searches of vehicles, vessels or premises for contraband, liquor, etc.;
- (4) verbal warnings, unless there is a seizure report or some other form of documentation on file relevant to the offence. Offences which are disposed of by written warnings, copies of which are retained on file, are to be reported on Form “C”. Such offences are to be scored as “actual” and cleared “otherwise.”

Column 3 - “Unfounded”

“Unfounded” means that the police investigation has established that a crime did not happen or was not attempted. For example, a report of a house-breaking is received. The investigation indicates that a man climbed through a window in his own home. He had locked himself out by mistake. A neighbour thought he was a burglar and called the police. This should be scored as one reported residential break and enter and then unfounded. Another example involves a reported theft of auto. The police investigate

and subsequently locate the vehicle. It turns out that a member of the family has taken the car. This should be scored as one offence of theft of auto and later unfounded.

Do not “unfound” an offence because the property reported stolen is located, is of little value, or a victim of any crime refuses to prosecute.

Do not “unfound” incidents solely on the basis of information received from the public particularly when the complaint is received by telephone.

#### Column 4 - “Actual Number”

An actual offence is one which, after police investigation, is deemed to have taken place.

By subtracting figures in column 3 from those in column 2, the number of actual offences is determined.

Occasionally an offence reported to the police has not been established as “actual” or “unfounded” by the time monthly returns are compiled for submission to the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics. Under these circumstances an offence is reported as “actual”. If investigation later establishes the offence was “unfounded”, an Adjustment Form should be completed and submitted to the Centre.

### C) Offence Clearance Data - Columns 5 and 6

#### Column 5 - "Offences Cleared by Charge"

Offences clearances are to be reported in the month they are cleared.

An offence can be "cleared by charge" when at least one charge is laid by the police against at least one person in connection with that offence. This rule applies to Young Offenders as well as adults.

When scoring offences "cleared by charge", it will be helpful to remember:

- (1) A number of offences may be "cleared by charge" when only ONE PERSON is charged (See e.g. 2.1);
- (2) SEVERAL PERSONS may be charged in connection with one offence.

(Note: In scoring the number of offences cleared by charge, the number of charges is not pertinent).

#### Example 2.1

One man assaults two elderly women. The offender is arrested and charged with two offences, as there are two victims. The two offences are cleared by the arrest of one person.

Score as follows:

Clearing an Offence with a Related Charge

An offence may be “cleared by charge” if a charge is laid in connection with the same offence. This charge may not always be identical with the offence. For example, a closely related lesser charge may be used to clear an offence. It is necessary to emphasize that the police must have sufficient evidence (not mere suspicion) that a charge might have been laid under the original offence against the same suspect. However, because they have better evidence of the lesser offence or because it was possible to obtain a guilty plea for the latter, the lesser charge was processed. The lesser “charge” is not to be reported in UCR data, although the original offence is to be cleared by charge.

This rule should not be used to clear extremely distinct offences. Where in the course of an investigation the apparent nature of the offence radically changes an adjustment form should be submitted, if the original offence category has already been reported to the Centre.

Example 2.3

A garage is broken into and money belonging to the company, a lap top computer and tools owned by several mechanics are stolen. A man is arrested in possession of the tools. There is sufficient evidence they were stolen by him at the time of the break and enter. It is decided to lay a charge of “possession of stolen property” in order to obtain a guilty plea. Only the breaking and entering is to be scored and “cleared by charge”. The possession charge is not to be counted as a second offence.

Score as follows:

Example 2.3A

Several months later another man is found in possession of the stolen lap top computer. The police establish that he had no connection with the breaking and entering but knew that the typewriter was stolen. He is charged with having stolen goods. This is a separate offence of “have stolen goods” and is counted and cleared in the month this offence became known. Score as follows:

### Offences cleared by charge versus persons charged

Offences and not persons charged are to be counted in Column 5. The number of persons arrested or charged makes no difference to the count of offences cleared.

#### Example 2.4

Five male young offenders steal a number of parcels from a delivery truck. They are charged. The one offence of theft where the total value is under \$5000 is “cleared by charge” as the result of charges being laid against the five offenders. Score as follows:

### Scoring additional persons charged subsequent to initial offence cleared by charge

If several persons commit an offence, and only one is charged initially, clear the offence by charge (column 5). When the remaining offenders are charged, do not clear the offence again but enter the additional “persons charged” data.

#### Example 2.5

Three men break into a store. One is charged. Score as follows:

Limited Companies – Where an Information is laid against a “limited company” the offence is to be cleared by charge and the persons charged data (Columns 7 to 11) are to be left blank. No additional report explaining the circumstances is required.

Column 6 – “Offence Cleared Otherwise”

In certain situations, the police may not be able to clear the offence by charge even though they have identified the offender and have sufficient evidence to support the laying of an information.

Criteria for Clearing Otherwise

If each of the following questions can be answered “yes”, then the offence can be “cleared otherwise” in column 6.

- (1) Has the offender been identified?
- (2) Is there enough evidence to support the laying of an Information?
- (3) Do the police exercise discretion or is there some additional reason outside their control which prevents the police from laying an information?

Situations where an offence can be “cleared otherwise” are limited to the following 13 examples:

- (1) The offender has died without being charged. If the offender has been charged before dying, the offence may be cleared by charge.
- (2) The offender is under the age of 12.
- (3) There is a directive from outside your department, e.g. the Attorney General or his agent, which instructs you not to prosecute in specific circumstances.
- (4) The offender has been committed to a mental hospital and it is unlikely he will be released.
- (5) Having regard to the circumstances, the police have exercised discretion and have decided not to charge although the offender has been identified and there is sufficient evidence to proceed with a charge.
- (6) The offender is identified but there is a definite obstacle to proceedings; e.g. diplomatic immunity.
- (7) The complainant or essential witness is dead and proceedings cannot be instituted.
- (8) The offender is known and sufficient evidence has been obtained but the complainant declines to prosecute or knows the offender(s) but refuses to identify them to the police - this does not “unfound” the offence.
- (9) The offender is serving a sentence and no useful purpose would be served in laying an information.
- (10) The offender is in a foreign country and cannot be returned (or the violation is under a Provincial Statute or municipal By-Law and the subject is in another province).
- (11) For young offenders the following circumstances would result in the offence being cleared otherwise:
  - referred to a screening agency whose decision is either to charge or not charge.
- (12) The offender has committed more than one offence; these offences have occurred at different times, locations and circumstances. It has been decided to charge him with only the most serious because no useful purpose would be served by proceeding with the other offences.



## (13) Diversion:

When an offence is “cleared otherwise” do not score persons data. See example 2.6. However, note an exception in the case of Young Offenders involved in offences cleared otherwise. These persons could be scored in the “Young Offenders Not Charged” column (11). See Example 2.10A.

Example 2.6

Two persons are murdered and the offender commits suicide. Because of the circumstances the offences are classified as murder and “cleared otherwise”.

Offences cannot be “cleared otherwise” on the basis that:

- (1) investigative leads have been exhausted;

or

- (2) further investigation is unwarranted;

or

- (3) the file is closed even though the offence is unsolved;

or

- (4) stolen property is recovered.

**D.) Persons Data:** “Persons Data” is a count of persons processed by the police. It also includes a count of Young Offenders who are not charged.

Columns 7 to 11 - “Persons Data” (Columns 7 to 10 - “Persons charged” - Column 11 “Young Offenders not charged”)

**DO NOT CONFUSE “PERSONS DATA” WITH OFFENCES “CLEARED BY CHARGE”**

Persons charged are to be reported in the month the person is charged.

“Persons data” is subdivided into “male” and “female”.

“Adult” is any person of eighteen years or over.

“Young Offender” is any person aged 12 to 17 inclusive.

N.B. Children under 12 cannot be charged and are not to be scored. If an offence is reported and subsequently found to have been committed by a child under 12 score offence data “cleared otherwise” but do not count the child under 12 in the Persons Data.

The police raid a suspected gaming house and charge the keeper and nine found-ins. Score as only one offence.

When a person is simultaneously charged with a series of offences, which have occurred over a period of time score the persons data only once and against the most serious offence but show the other offences as cleared by charge.

Example 2.9

Two adult males are charged with a series of separate crimes which they committed together over a period of several days. Charges include robbery, breaking and entering two offices, theft of a car and one offence of shoplifting where the property stolen exceeded \$5,000 in each case. AS ALL THE OFFENCES TOOK PLACE AT DIFFERENT TIMES AND PLACES they are counted and cleared but the persons charged are only recorded against the most serious offence which is Robbery. Score as follows:

It might have happened that some of these offences could have been reported to the police and scored as “actual offences” in previous months. Therefore do not score again as “actual offences” but record clearance data in the current month.

**N.B. The Relationship Between Number of Offences Cleared by Charge and Number of Persons Charged.**

It is not usual to have the same number of “persons charged” as offences “cleared by charge” for all of the offence categories in a monthly report. However, a continued balance between offences “cleared by charge” and “persons charged” suggests a misunderstanding of instructions.

Young Offenders “Charged” - Columns 9 and 10

Record only those Young Offenders who are charged by the police when the decision to charge is a police decision.

Young Offenders Not Charged - Column 11

Young Offenders “Not Charged” is to record all other proceedings. These will include:

(1) Referral for decision to:

- (a) a prosecutor
- (b) any other designated authority whether or not an information is subsequently laid.

(2) All cases where the police exercise discretion and decide not to charge.

All offences committed by Young Offenders but where no charges are laid by the police are to be cleared otherwise.

Example 2.10A

The police apprehend a male young offender for breaking school windows. They talk to the parents who make restitution and state they will exercise more supervision over their son. The police decide not to charge the offender. This case would be scored as one offence of Mischief under \$5,000 which would be “cleared otherwise” in column 6 and one Young Offender “not charged” in column 11.

Score as follows:

**Manslaughter - Section 232 C.C.**

**Code 004**

Section 232 of the Criminal Code defines manslaughter as a “culpable homicide that would otherwise be murder” but “the person who committed it did so in the heat of passion caused by sudden provocation”. The code states that “a wrongful act or insult that is of such nature as to be sufficient to deprive an ordinary person of the power of self-control is provocation enough” if the accused acted immediately and before there was time for passion to subside.

The Criminal Code also defines manslaughter as culpable homicide that is not murder, infanticide, or causing death by criminal negligence.

Manslaughter is an indictable offence for which the maximum punishment is life imprisonment.

**Example 3.3**

A death is investigated by the police. They conclude the death is a manslaughter. A man is arrested and charged. Score one offence of manslaughter, cleared by charge, and one person charged.

**Infanticide - Section 233 C.C.**

**Code 005**

Section 233 of the Criminal Code states that an infanticide is committed when a female person, by wilful act or omission, causes the death of her newly-born child (under one year of age), if at that time she had not fully recovered from the effects of childbirth.

Note: (a) Killing unborn child S. 238 C.C. should be scored - **Code 073** as this offence is not collected in the Homicide survey.

Infanticide is an indictable offence for which the maximum punishment is imprisonment for 5 years.

A woman is charged with infanticide. Score as follows:

**SUPPLEMENTARY HOMICIDE RETURN**

Due to the importance of homicide statistics, police contributors are asked to complete the reverse side of form "C" giving the date of the offence, location, the name(s) of the victim(s) and person(s) charged. The name(s) of victim(s) and person(s) charged must equal the number of offences and persons charged reported for codes 002 to 005 on Form "C".

The Canadian Centre of Justice Statistics at Statistics Canada will then send the investigating police service a Homicide Return for completion and return to the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics. These additional forms are used to collect detailed information on the homicide.

**ATTEMPTED MURDER - Section. 239 C.C.**

**COUNT ONE OFFENCE FOR EACH VICTIM**

Everyone who attempts by any means to commit murder is guilty of an indictable offence and is liable to imprisonment for life (Section 239 C.C.- **Code 006**).

Please note that the Attempted Murder classification has been removed from the Total Homicide category to become a separate classification on form "C" Crime Statistics, **Code 006**.

A man walking alone down a deserted street hears someone come up behind him. Before he can turn around a male voice says "Don't turn around or I'll kill you. Give me your money". The man hands over his wallet and turns to see a youth running away.

Score one incident of Other Robbery **Code 021**, since threat of violence was used.

Example 3.14

A young woman came face to face with a man in a stairway. The man, after seeing no one around, told the woman to give her purse to him because he had a knife in his pocket. Even though she didn't see a knife, she gave her purse to him and he ran off.

Score one incident of Robbery with Other Offensive Weapons **Code 020** because a weapon other than a firearm was simulated.

(a) When a building has one occupant, for example, a warehouse, store, shop, etc., and is broken into, score only one offence. (See example 3.15).

**Example 3.15**

A grocery warehouse is broken into during the night. The building consists of many partitioned rooms. All the room occupied by the same firm are plundered. No arrests were made. This is one incident and therefore one offence of B&E - Business Premises, is to be scored. The number of rooms ransacked makes no difference if the building is occupied by one firm.

(b) When a building contains several independently occupied residences such as apartments, suites or hotel rooms, each one entered would be scored as a separate offence.

A man enters three apartments in an apartment house and steals items from each apartment. The culprit is arrested. These are three incidents; score three offences of “Breaking and Entering - Residence” since each apartment is considered a residence.

(a) Includes all other Breaking and Entering, e.g. Trains, box-cars, “Piggy-Backs”, and unattached truck trailers, detached garages etc. (Score one offence for any number broken into when grouped in one location. Grouped in one location means the same spur or siding or yard etc.).

(b) For offences involving storage lockers or storage containers in apartment buildings, condominiums, warehouses and enclosures, etc., the following applies: If the lockers are within a “place” as described in C.C. Section 348(3) count only one offence of breaking and entering regardless of the number of lockers involved. N.B. if the lockers are not within a “place”, score as a theft only.

Example 3.19

Investigation shows that two box-cars on the same siding have been broken into and articles stolen. An adult male is charged. This is one incident; score one offence of “Other Breaking and Entering”.

The number of box-cars entered makes no difference. Count one offence for each distinct operation.

**THEFTS**

**THEFTS****(INCLUDE ATTEMPTED OFFENCES)****COUNT ONE OFFENCE FOR EACH DISTINCT INCIDENT**

- (a) In the UCR survey, theft is divided into three large categories:
  - 1) Theft of Motor Vehicles,
  - 2) Theft of All Other Property over \$5,000,
  - 3) Theft of All Other Property \$5,000 and Under.
- (b) Theft and Criminal Code Sections 322 and 335.

It is difficult to allocate UCR Theft categories (**Codes 026 to 040 inclusive**) to specific, unique Criminal Code sections. This is because the UCR Theft categories are based on specific articles of property stolen (e.g., automobiles) while other principles guide the relevant Criminal Code sections (322 to 335 inclusive). In short, a one to one match with no duplication is impossible.

**(1) THEFT OF MOTOR VEHICLE****(INCLUDE ATTEMPTED OFFENCES)****Theft of Motor Vehicle** Sections. 334, 335**Codes 026-030**

(a) Include cases where a motor vehicle is taken without the owner's consent. If a boat or vessel is taken, score under Other Theft - Codes 035 or 040.

(b) Theft of Two or More Motor Vehicles.

When a number of vehicles are stolen at the same time and place, count one offence for each vehicle. For example, the theft of two vehicles would constitute two offences. However, the theft of four vehicles at the same time from a new or used car lot would involve one offence only.

**Definition of a Motor Vehicle**

A motor vehicle for the purpose of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program - is a vehicle which is propelled or driven otherwise than by muscular power but does not include a vehicle which operates on rails.

**Established Categories**

(a) Automobiles - include all models of automobiles and station wagons.

(b) Trucks - includes all models of trucks and buses designed to transport people or freight, including sport-utility vehicles, vans, mini-vans and motor homes.



- (c) Motorcycle - includes all types of motorcycles with two or three wheels such as motorized bicycles, motor scooters.
- (d) Other Motor Vehicles - motorized snow vehicles, farm tractors and other self-propelled farming implements. Cranes, fork-lifts, graders, bulldozers and other self-propelled vehicles designed and used on construction sites, building and maintenance of roads and in the lumber industry, army tanks, army jeeps and all-terrain vehicles.

Registration shall not be a criterion for determining whether a particular vehicle is a motor vehicle or not.

The following are not to be considered as motor vehicles: boats, vessels of all types, aircrafts, hovercrafts, golf-carts, power wheelchairs, lawn and garden tractors and non-commercial type snowblowers.

Four men working as a gang steal three cars from a parking lot. They are later apprehended. Count three offences; one for each vehicle.

**GUIDELINES: CHOOSING AMONG**

- Attempted Theft of Auto
- Attempted Theft from Auto
- Mischief

- 1) If there is any evidence of an attempt to start the automobile, score as an attempted "Theft of Motor Vehicle", **Code 027**
- 2) If there is evidence of an attempt to remove something from the car, score as an attempted "Theft from Motor Vehicle" (**Code 033 or Code 038**, depending upon the dollar value).
- 3) If damage was done to the automobile but there was no attempt to start the car or remove anything from the car, score as an offence of Mischief (**Code 071 or 072**, depending upon the dollar value).

**(2) THEFT OVER \$5,000****(INCLUDE ATTEMPTED OFFENCES)****(COUNT ONE OFFENCE FOR EACH DISTINCT INCIDENT)**

Theft from a number of owners located in the same place at one time constitutes a single incident and therefore a single offence. For example, theft of seven wallets from lockers in a gym at one time constitutes one offence. Thefts from four motor vehicles on the same parking lot at the same time are scored as one offence if it is determined that they took place in one continuous operation. Thefts from twenty motor vehicles on a dealer's car lot are always considered as one offence (one owner). Finally, simultaneous theft of a number of bicycles from the same location would be scored as a single offence. This applies to both this section and theft under \$5,000

However, different stores in a shopping complex are considered different places, and therefore the number of offences in such a situation is equal to the number of establishments which experience a loss.

**Theft Over \$5,000** Sections. 322 to 332 and 334(a) C.C.**Codes 031-035**

Includes cases of thefts and attempted thefts over \$5,000. The recovery of stolen property does not "unfound" or "clear" the offence.

**Theft of Bicycles Over \$5,000** Section. 334(a) C.C.**Code 032**

Bicycle thefts are to be scored in **Code 032** if value is over \$5,000. If one bicycle is stolen and is valued over \$5,000 score one theft in **Code 032**. If several bicycles are stolen in one distinct incident, and their total value exceeds \$5,000, count one theft in **Code 032**.

**Theft From Motor Vehicles Over \$5,000 Section 334(a)**  
(include parts and contents)

**Code 033**

Theft from motor vehicles are to be scored in **Code 033** if the value is over \$5,000. Thefts from motor vehicles include theft of parts and contents. If one motor vehicle is broken into and the contents stolen were valued over \$5,000, score one theft in **Code 033**. If there were thefts from 3 motor vehicles in the same parking lot at the same time and the value of the property stolen from each vehicle is \$2,000, score one offence in **Code 033** if it is determined that the thefts took place in one continuous operation. If it is determined that the incidents were separate, score 3 offences in **Code 038** (Theft \$5,000 and under).

Example 3.23

A man broke a window of a locked automobile and removed a camera and CD player valued at \$5,225. When surprised by the owner, the man got away. Score one offence.

Example 3.24

Three automobiles in the same parking lot are broken into and radios and tape players are taken. The total worth of the stolen equipment is \$5,800. There is reason to believe these thefts were carried out at the same time by the same person. This therefore is one offence of Theft from Motor Vehicle Over \$5,000. Score as UCR **Code 033**.

If there is no evidence that the three thefts were carried out at the same time by the same person, and the value of the property stolen for one theft is \$5,100, then score one offence as **Code 033** and the other two offences of Theft from Motor Vehicle \$5,000 and Under (**Code 038**).

Having in possession is often straight forward, i.e., an offender is found to be in "possession", the offence is reported and a charge is laid.

It sometimes happens that a theft occurs in one jurisdiction that is reported in columns 2 (reported or known to police) and 4 (actual number) and at a later date an accused is arrested in another jurisdiction and charged with "possession". In cases of this nature, the department laying the "possession charge will clear the offence in column 5 (cleared by charge) and show persons charged. The department originally reporting the "theft" will clear the offence "otherwise" if there is sufficient evidence to lay a charge of theft against this individual.

### COUNT ONE OFFENCE FOR EACH DISTINCT INCIDENT

Includes false pretences, forgery, uttering, fraud and all related offences as defined in the Criminal Code. Scoring of these offences often presents difficulty relating to the definition of a separate or distinct incident and to the most serious offence rule of scoring (Chapter 1). All the various circumstances which arise cannot be covered by examples, but the following deal with the more common:

- 1) An offender passes three bad cheques in a large department store in the same day. Score one offence, as one complainant is involved.
- 2) An offender passes one bad cheque in each of three different stores on the same day. Score three offences, as three complainants are involved.
- 3) An offender steals a credit card and later uses or attempts to use the credit card. Score two offences of fraud: credit card. **Code 044**
- 4) In credit card fraud cases, where one credit card is used over a period of time score one offence only. Where several credit cards are used, score one offence for each different credit card used i.e. Eatons, Sears, The Bay, etc. Score one offence for each credit card used, regardless of the number of times used.

- (b) If investigation reveals the call was a hoax, the call was in itself an offence of uttering threats under Section 264(1) C.C. and should be scored **Code 073** (i.e. Other Criminal Code Offence).

## **SCORING OF DRUG OFFENCES**

### **FOUND DRUGS**

When a quantity of drugs are found and it appears that the drugs were hidden or placed there by an individual(s), the incident should be scored as an offence of possession. If the quantity is large enough, possession for the purpose of trafficking may be scored.

If the find is a plant(s) of marijuana and they appear to be growing wild, the find should not be scored.

### **DRUGS INTERCEPTED**

Drugs in significant quantities recovered in transit without a personal carrier (such as the mail, courier company, ship line etc.) and originating from a point outside of the country or intended for a point outside of the country should be scored as an attempt to import/export drugs. Otherwise score as above under "found drugs".

**SCORING OF DRUG OFFENCES**

- a. Count one offence for each distinct incident.

Example 3.26

A male person is stopped on the street and checked, and found to be in possession of 1 cap of heroin. He is charged with possession. Score as follows:

**INTOXICATION**

In provinces where persons are detained by police under provisions of the Intoxicated Persons Detention Act are not considered to have committed an offence, respondents are asked not to classify, score and report these detentions as offences under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

N.B.: Note that for scoring purposes, only one offence would be scored if several minors were picked up in a "raid" on a tavern or beer parlor.

To be used to score breaches of all Provincial Statutes other than Liquor (104) and Securities Act (105). (Count one offence for each distinct incident).

Report all offences under your Municipal By-Laws except traffic.

N.B.: In some jurisdictions Municipal By-Laws have been enacted to regulate behaviour of youths, i.e. curfews. Count these under this classification.

**SPECIAL CODES**

**Codes 991 to 995** on Form "C" are "open ended categories" and can be used by any contributing department for internal use, e.g. collecting data on specific crimes not listed

on Form C for special surveys. (It is requested that the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics be advised when these codes are used and of the use they are being put to).

**TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT STATISTICS****INCLUDES TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT  
AND TRAFFIC ACCIDENT STATISTICS**

Please be advised that Other Traffic Offences, Parking Violations, Traffic Accidents, and Persons Killed and Injured, **Codes 720 to 733**, are no longer required for the UCR Program of the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics. Should Police Services, Police Commissions or others require this information, Police Services may wish to continue to collect this data. To this end, the Form "T" will be supplied to respondents in its present format.

## Chapter IV

### Form "T" – Traffic Enforcement Statistics

Police contributors are requested to complete and forward Form "T" – traffic Enforcement Statistics each month. For a facsimile of a form "T" see Appendix 2.

Form "T" has two parts:

- 1) Traffic Enforcement – which is to be reported to the UCR Program of the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics. This includes both Criminal Code offences and selected Provincial Statute offences.
- 2) Optional Reporting Section (shaded area at bottom of Form "T"). This includes Other Traffic Offences (Total Charges), Parking Violation, Traffic Accidents, Persons Killed, and Persons Injured. This section may be required by your force and therefore scoring rules have been included in this manual.

#### General Comments on Scoring Form "T":

All traffic offences are to be reported on Form "T" and are not to be reported on Form "C". For incidents which involve both traffic and Form "C" offences, the most serious offence of each type is to be reported on the corresponding form.

Warnings: Do not score written or verbal warnings on Form "T".

The most serious offence rule applies only to the first section,

Traffic Enforcement: **Codes 701-719**. It does not apply to the shaded Optional Reporting Section: **Codes 720-733**.

### **TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT SECTION**

The traffic enforcement portion of Form "T" deals with traffic offences under the Criminal Code and Provincial Statutes as follows:

- (a) Offences Listing or Classification (Column 1)
  - offences such as Dangerous Operation of Motor Vehicle Causing Death. Offence Data (Columns 4-6)
- (b) Offence Data (Columns 4-6)
  - offences reported and cleared.
- (c) Persons Data (Columns 7-8)
  - number of males and females (including adults and Young Offenders) charged with offences.

**Dangerous Operation of Motor Vehicle, or Boat, Vessel/ Aircraft – Causing Death Sections. 249(1), 249(4) C.C. Code**  
**701, 702**

- Count only one offence per incident regardless of the number of victims.

A motorist drives through a red traffic light, killing two pedestrians. He is arrested and charged.

**Dangerous Operation of Motor Vehicle, or Boat, Vessel/ Aircraft – Causing bodily harm** - Sections. 249(1), 249(3), C.C. **Code 703, 704**

Regardless of the number of victims, count only ONE OFFENCE.

Offences where a motor vehicle, boat, vessel or aircraft has been operated in a criminally negligent manner and no death or bodily injury has occurred.

A car speeds down a busy thoroughfare, weaving in and out of traffic, narrowly missing other vehicles and pedestrians. When police take up pursuit, the driver increases speed, going through stop signs and red lights. He loses control after sideswiping another vehicle and crashes into a light standard. He is arrested.

General comments on Impaired Traffic Offences:

- (a) Only one offence is to be scored for each incident. In cases involving "Impaired Operation" and "Fail or Refuse" offences, score only the more serious one, if the Refusal takes place at the scene of the Impaired Operation.
- (b) Do not score a report of erratic or dangerous driving as Impaired Operation of Motor Vehicle, or Boat, Vessel or Aircraft merely on the basis of unsubstantiated information e.g. "the guy must have been drunk to drive like that".
- (c) In situations where a person, while his ability to drive is impaired by alcohol or a drug, drives a motor vehicle, boat, vessel or aircraft or has the care or control of a motor vehicle, boat, vessel or aircraft whether it is in motion or not, score one offence.

**Fail to Stop or Remain at Scene of Accident** Section. 252(1) C.C  
**Code 715.**

Count offences where the driver of a motor vehicle which is involved in an accident failed to: (1) stop or remain at the scene of an accident, (2) give his name and address, (3) offer assistance where any person has been injured REGARDLESS OF THE EXTENT OF INJURY, AMOUNT OF PROPERTY DAMAGE, OR LOCATION OF ACCIDENT. Regardless of the number of persons, vehicles, etc. involved in the incident, count one offence for each incident.

**Driving While Prohibited** Section. 259(4) C.C.

**Code 716**

- offences where a person drives a motor vehicle in Canada while disqualified or prohibited from driving by reason of the legal suspension or cancellation, in any province, of his permit or licence to drive a motor vehicle.

**Fail to Stop or Remain at Scene of Accident – Provincial Statute.** **Code 717**

Count offences where the driver of a motor vehicle which is involved in an accident failed to: (1) stop or remain at the scene of an accident, (2) give his name and address, (3) offer assistance where any person has been injured REGARDLESS OF THE EXTENT OF INJURY, AMOUNT OF PROPERTY DAMAGE, OR LOCATION OF ACCIDENT. Regardless of the number of persons, vehicles, etc. involved in the incident, count one offence for each incident.

**Dangerous Driving or Without Due Care and Attention – Provincial Statute**  
**Code 718**

Score offences where the driver of a motor vehicle drives on a street, road, highway or other public place in a manner that is dangerous to the public, having regard to all circumstances. This offence is usually defined in relevant provincial legislation as driving without due care and attention, or careless driving.

**Driving While Disqualified or While License Suspended or Cancelled – Provincial Statute.** **Code 719**

- offences where a person drives a motor vehicle in Canada while disqualified or prohibited from driving by reason of the legal suspension or cancellation, in any province, of his permit or licence to drive a motor vehicle.

**II) OPTIONAL REPORTING SECTION (Shaded Area on Form “T”)**

**Voluntary Appearance**

When a fine is paid before a formal charge is laid for traffic offences, **Codes 720, 721 and 722**, on Form “T”, the “total charges” data are to be completed.

**Parking Violations**

Include all parking infractions under Federal Statutes, Provincial statutes and Municipal bylaws dealt with by your department or by authorized personnel under your supervision.

- Includes charges against both adults and Young Offenders.

**Traffic Accidents****Codes 724 - 727**

Motor vehicle traffic accidents are to be counted according to the following:

- 1) fatal
- 2) non-fatal (injury)
- 3) property damage

A motor vehicle traffic accident should only be counted once when there is a combination of a fatality or injury and property damage. It should be scored against the most serious of these classifications when they are in combination; i.e. when there is a fatal accident and property damage, score as a fatal accident only. Report all traffic accidents investigated by your department where the damage involved exceeds the provincial limit.

**Number of Fatal Accidents****Code 724**

Include fatal accidents where your police department is responsible for the investigation.

Count the number of accidents, not victims.

Remember to score the number of persons killed in these accidents in **Code 728** and in the classification **Codes 729, 730, 731, and 732** as applicable.

Persons who die within a year and a day as a result of an accident are to be included.

**TALLY SHEET FORM “C” - CRIME STATISTICS**

Tally sheets for Form “C” – Crime Statistics, and Form “T” – Traffic Enforcement Statistics are designed as work sheets for the convenience of contributors in compiling figures for monthly returns to Statistics Canada.

These sheets contain columns identical with those in the corresponding forms but allow space for tally marks. If necessary, a tally sheet may be used as a daily working copy or to suit your particular needs.

Count tally marks in each box on the tally sheet and write these totals in the appropriate box. Transfer these totals to Form “C” – Crime Statistics at the end of the month.

### **TALLY SHEET – FOR “T” – TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT STATISTICS**

The reporting columns on tally sheets for “Traffic Enforcement Statistics” are identical with those on Form “C” – Crime Statistics with the exception of “Persons Charged” and “Total Charges”.

Traffic statistics to be reported are defined on the tally sheets and more specifically in Chapter IV.

Detailed instructions and illustrations on the proper method of classifying and scoring traffic enforcement and persons charged data and, traffic accidents, persons killed and injured are also given in Chapter IV.

Count tally marks in each box on the tally sheets and write figures in the appropriate box. Transfer these totals to Form “T” – Traffic Enforcement Statistics at the end of the month.

## Chapter VI

### ADJUSTMENT FORM

If adjustments or corrections are required to Forms “C” and “T” previously submitted, please notify Statistics Canada by forwarding a completed “Adjustment Form” as soon as possible.

These forms are solely for the correction of errors or omissions in returns previously submitted. The numbers on the adjustment form should be the final “real” numbers, not a record of changes involving pluses and minuses.

DO NOT submit an “Adjustment Form” to report previously unsolved offences as “cleared” or additional “persons data”. Such data are to be included in your reports for the month in which the offence is “cleared” and “persons are charged”.

Instructions on the proper method of completing the “Adjustment Form” are given on the reverse side of the form.

Particular attention is directed to paragraph 5. (d) in the instructions which states final and complete figures must be given in all columns 2 to 11 inclusive for items requiring adjustment – not only in the column(s) in which figures are to be changed.

A quantity of these forms will be supplied to each contributing police force annually. Additional copies will be provided on request.

Please do not submit several month’s data on one form. One form for each month’s data should be submitted.

**ADJUSTMENTS TO RETURNS** - In cases where the police uncover evidence of a more serious offence in connection with an incident which has been previously classified, scored and reported to Statistics Canada in a less serious classification the following will apply:

Where the evidence supports a change in classification, the offence and persons charged data are to be deleted from the original classification and scored in the more serious one. (Always report the most serious offence).

    - 2) A description of the section
    - 3) Maximum penalty of the section
    - 4) Corresponding UCR Code(s)
- B) Table of UCR Codes with the Corresponding Criminal Code Sections and Drug Statutes.
- This table contains exactly the same information but it is sorted by UCR Code in ascending order, i.e. this table lists the legal sections which apply to a specific UCR code, whereas the first table shows the UCR code(s) which apply to a particular legal section.
