

	<u>Probation</u> - Refers to a type of court isposition imposed on an individual which is served in the community and under conditions of supervision. A probation order may be given in conjunction with a suspended sentence, a conditional discharge, a fine, or in conjunction with a jail sentence
	<u>Parole</u> - A form of conditional release from custody whereby an inmate who is considered eligible may be released, at a time considered appropriate by a parole board, to serve the balance of a sentence under supervision in the community subject to stated condition.
	Statutory Release - Statutory release allows most federally sentenced offenders who have not been gran ed parole to serve the final third of their sentences in the community under supervision and under conditions of release like those imposed on offenders released on full parole.
